The Falling Waters Trail travels

through a geologic region of springs and

headwaters of four major Michigan rivers.

Native Americans called this area "The

Land of Falling Waters." At the western

trailhead in Concord, the trail crosses

a bridge over the Kalamazoo River where

you can view a great expanse of marshy

wetlands. One of the highlights of the

trail is a causeway that runs through

lakes in Jackson County that form the

rail-trail destinations - and for many

good reasons.

Jackson Inter-City Trail

As the trail crosses east over Weatherwax Road, it enters the City of Jackson and changes its name to the Jackson Inter-City Trail. This 3.4-mile section of trail travels through quiet suburban neighborhoods, then turns north and follows Cooper Street to downtown Jackson and the Grand River ArtsWalk.

Grand River ArtsWalk

Dedicated in 2010, The Grand River Arts-Walk is a 1.5-mile multi-use trail that travels through Jackson's growing arts and entertainment district. It's also an important link in a long-range plan to build a continuous bike trail from South Haven to Port Huron. The current trail route begins where Cooper Street meets the Grand River. From there, continue west on Michigan Avenue and go north on Mechanic Street through the Armory Art Village (historic site of former state prison). Follow the paved path north along the banks of the Grand River.
