



Border-to-Border Trail (Ann Arbor to Ypsilanti)

Follow the Huron River and explore several parks, historic sites and natural areas on the Ann Arbor to Ypsilanti section of the Border-to-Border Trail. This 10.5-mile paved trail is part of a long-term plan to create a continuous 35-mile trail across Washtenaw County along the edge of the Huron River.

Soak up the changing scenery as you ride through the river valley. We recommend starting your journey at Bandemer Park and following the path all the way to Ypsilanti and back. As you head south along Argo Pond, you'll pass by the Ann Arbor Rowing Club boathouse and cross over Argo Dam. Here you'll find the Argo Livery and Argo Cascades, where you can rent kayaks or tubes and play in a series of man-made rapids.

After you pass through Riverside Park, the trail crosses two bridges over the Huron River and follows the edge

of the river to Gallup Park and Dixboro Dam. East of the dam, a trail loop winds through Parker Mill County Park where you can visit a historic, operable grist mill. Pay close attention to the "B2B" directional signs to make sure you stay on the designated trail. Wayfinding kiosks are stationed at several locations along the route.

Huron River Water Trail

The 104 miles of Huron River Water Trail from Proud Lake to Lake Erie is recognized as a National Water Trail with easy access and beautiful scenery along its entire route. Of the 10 miles of river shown on this map, the 3.5-mile section between the Argo and Gallup Liveries is a pleasant 1.5-hour paddle – and quite likely the most popular stretch of water trail in all of Michigan.
